HURRICANE TERMS TO KNOW

Tropical Disturbance or Wave- A cluster of clouds and thunderstorms in the tropics without a defined circulation, moving from east to west.

Tropical Storm- A rotating system of strong thunderstorms with top sustained winds of 39 to 73 miles per hour. Tropical storms are dangerous by themselves, and can quickly develop into hurricanes. Storms are named when they reach this strength.

Hurricane- A tropical cyclone with pronounced counter-clockwise rotation, low-pressure center and sustained wind speeds of 74 miles per hour.

HURRICANE ALERTS

Preliminary Alert-Hurricane conditions are possible in the specific area of the 'Alert' usually within 72 hours.

Hurricane Watch (Red 1)- Hurricane conditions are possible in the specific area of the 'Alert' within 36 hours.

Hurricane Warning (Red 11)- Hurricane conditions are expected in the specific area of the warning within 24 hours.

ALL CLEAR- The hurricane has passed. (This does not mean you are authorized to leave a shelter.)



WHAT IS NEMO?

The National Emergency Management Organization is the primary Government of Belize Department responsible for disaster mitigation, public preparedness, response, recovery and reconstruction in Belize.

The NEMO Department is the full-time agency responsible for the training of responding agencies and fosters coordination across the public and private sector during non-crises periods.

The Department is also mandated to keep Belize in a state of preparedness for any emergency that may require a national response.

MISSION STATEMENT

The National Emergency Management Organization, in cooperation with the respective emergency management committees, and all public and private agencies, is established to preserve life and property in the event of an emergency, threatened or real, and to mitigate the impact on the country and its people.

EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTERS

Emergency Operations Centers are facilities that are established to serve as 24 hour coordination centers. They are staffed by trained individuals who are capable of managing various aspects of an emergency including response and relief operations.



LEVELS OF RESPONSE

- 1. The National Level (NEMO is fully activated)
- 2. The District Level (NEMO is partially activated)
- 3. The Village Level (NEMO is locally activated)

DISTRICT EMERGENCY COMMITTEES
